Had received advisory opinions from the ethics commission before. So, he, you know, he knew how to deal with our office. So, the -- my memory is, that he said that, that some long time ago he had applied-he had -- he had, uh, signed a purchase and sale agreement for a piece of property, and it was contingent upon getting a Wetlands Permit, uh, from DEM; that he, and or the seller, or some combination of the two of them, had applied for that permit and that it had -- it had been a long and drawn out process. Um, and, that, at some point after he became, Chief of Staff to the Governor, it -- it just kind of out of the blue got approved. That was -and, um, so he asked, is there any issues since I'm the Chief of Staff now, with the DEM approving my -this Wetlands Permit? And so, I think the -- the kind of advice I gave him was, well, you know, the question really is whether you took any action while you were the Governor's Chief of Staff to lobby the DEM to approve this permit.

But the 2.4 complaint that was filed with us, alleged a violation 25 of the Financial Disclosure Laws.

Gammit: Which is that he didn't list his interest in 45

Canning on his financial disclosure statement.

And -- and the truth is he, he may not have even had to. It kind of depends what his interest in the property was. I know that the re -- what's being reported is that he had a purchase in sale agreement. Um, but we'll-- we're gonna get a hold of whatever it was, so maybe you already know. But it makes a difference to us, as to whether he needed to disclose it, um, as to exactly what kind of contract he had with the seller. Was it a purchase and sale agreement? Was it an option to purchase? Was it some other type of, uh, financial interest, and depending upon what it turns out to be, uh, he may or may not have had to include that on his financial disclosure statement.

19 | Salisbury: Right. Okay.

Gammit: Um, then if we get information through the course of that investigation, or if you, or the AG's office, end up referring some information over to us that indicates that -- that he was lobbying DEM while he was the Governor's Chief of Staff, then it may turn into that type of investigation also.
