Dear Attorney General:

I write to inform you that Krispy Kreme Doughnut Corporation (“Krispy Kreme”) is sending notices to Rhode Island residents notifying them of a data breach that compromised the security of certain personal information.

On November 29, 2024, Krispy Kreme was notified regarding unauthorized activity on a portion of its information technology systems. Upon learning of the unauthorized activity, Krispy Kreme immediately began taking steps to investigate, contain, and remediate the incident with the assistance of leading cybersecurity experts. Krispy Kreme also notified law enforcement.

After conducting an extensive and comprehensive data review, Krispy Kreme ultimately confirmed on May 22, 2025, that a data breach had occurred impacting personal information, including the personal information of certain Rhode Island residents. Krispy Kreme has now completed the data review and validation process and will be notifying a total of 125 impacted Rhode Island residents.

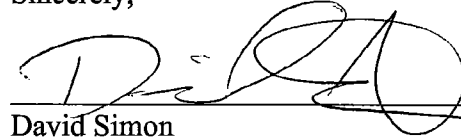
The personal information of the impacted Rhode Island residents includes: name, date of birth, Social Security number, and financial account access information.

For the convenience of Rhode Island residents, Krispy Kreme has arranged to make credit monitoring and identity protection services available to impacted Rhode Island residents at no cost for one year.

Notification will be sent via U.S. Mail to the Rhode Island residents whose personal information was impacted on June 16, 2025. A copy of Krispy Kreme's sample individual notice is enclosed. Notification will also be provided via substitute notice, pursuant to state statutory requirements.

Notice of Data Breach

We are writing to inform you of a data security incident that involved some of your personal information. We take the protection and proper use of your information very seriously. We are writing to notify you of the incident, offer you complimentary identity monitoring services, and inform you of steps you can take to help protect your personal information.

What Happened?

On November 29, 2024, Krispy Kreme Doughnut Corporation ("Krispy Kreme") was notified regarding unauthorized activity on a portion of its information technology systems. Upon learning of the unauthorized activity, we immediately began taking steps to investigate, contain, and remediate the incident with the assistance of leading cybersecurity experts. On May 22, 2025, we determined that your personal information was impacted by this incident. There is no evidence that your information has been misused, and we are not aware of any reports of identity theft or fraud as a direct result of this incident. However, out of an abundance of caution, we are notifying you about the incident and providing you with resources to help you protect your personal information.

What Information Was Involved?

What We Are Doing.

In addition to containing the incident, we contacted law enforcement and engaged leading cybersecurity firms to assist us in assessing the incident's scope and cause. Free Credit Report. It is recommended that you remain vigilant by reviewing account statements and monitoring your credit report for unauthorized activity, especially activity that may indicate fraud and identity theft. You may obtain a copy of your credit report, free of charge, once every 12 months from each of the three nationwide credit reporting agencies.

You can also order your annual free credit report by mailing a completed Annual Credit Report Request Form (available from the U.S. Federal Trade Commission's ("FTC") website at www.consumer.ftc.gov) to:

Fraud Alerts. There are two types of fraud alerts you can place on your credit report to put your creditors on notice that you may be a victim of fraud—an initial alert and an extended alert. You may ask that an initial fraud alert be placed on your credit report if you suspect you have been, or are about to be, a victim of identity theft. An initial fraud alert stays on your credit report for at least one year. You may have an extended alert placed on your credit report if you have already been a victim of identity theft and you have the appropriate documentary proof. An extended fraud alert stays on your credit report for seven years. You can place a fraud alert on your credit report by contacting any of the three national credit reporting agencies.

Security Freeze. You have the ability to place a security freeze, also known as a credit freeze, on your credit report free of charge.

A security freeze is intended to prevent credit, loans and services from being approved in your name without your consent. To place a security freeze on your credit report, you may use an online process, an automated telephone line, or submit a written request to any of the three credit reporting agencies listed above. The following information must be included when requesting a security freeze (note that, if you are requesting a credit report for your spouse, this information must be provided for him/her as well): (1) full name, with middle initial and any suffixes; (2) Social Security number; (3) date of birth; (4) current address and any previous addresses for the past 5 years; and (5) any applicable incident report or complaint with a law enforcement agency or the Registry of Motor Vehicles. The request must also include a copy of a government-issued identification card and a copy of a recent utility bill or bank or insurance statement. It is essential that each copy be legible, and display your name, current mailing address, and the date of issue.

Federal Trade Commission and State Attorneys General Offices. If you believe you are the victim of identity theft or have reason to believe your personal information has been misused, you should immediately contact the Federal Trade Commission and/or the Attorney General's office in your home state. You may also contact these agencies for information on how to prevent or minimize the risks of identity theft.

You have rights under the federal Fair Credit Reporting Act ("FCRA"), which governs the collection and use of information about you by the consumer reporting agencies. Reporting of identity theft and obtaining a police report. You have the right to file or obtain a police report if you are a victim of identity theft.



TAKE ADVANTAGE OF YOUR IDENTITY MONITORING SERVICES

You have been provided with access to the following services from Kroll:

Single Bureau Credit Monitoring

You will receive alerts when there are changes to your credit data—for instance, when a new line of credit is applied for in your name. If you do not recognize the activity, you'll have the option to call a Kroll fraud specialist, who will be able to help you determine if it is an indicator of identity theft. To receive credit services, you must be over the age of 18 and have established credit in the U.S., have a Social Security number in your name, and have a U.S. residential address associated with your credit file.

Fraud Consultation

You have unlimited access to consultation with a Kroll fraud specialist. Support includes showing you the most effective ways to protect your identity, explaining your rights and protections under the law, assistance with fraud alerts, and interpreting how personal information is accessed and used, including investigating suspicious activity that could be tied to an identity theft event.

Identity Theft Restoration

If you become a victim of identity theft, an experienced Kroll licensed investigator will work on your behalf to resolve related issues. You will have access to a dedicated investigator who understands your issues and can do most of the work for you. Your investigator will be able to dig deep to uncover the scope of the identity theft, and then work to resolve it.
