Members of the Commission:

It is an honor to submit my application for consideration to serve as Rhode Island's first Inspector General. I currently serve as Inspector General of the United States Capitol Police (USCP) and previously have served as the Inspector General for the Florida Department of Financial Services (DFS) and the City of Albuquerque. Across these federal, state, and municipal roles – and throughout a 35-year career with the Air Force Office of Special Investigations (AFOSI), I have built strong oversight capacity, led sensitive investigations and audits. I have also developed and led multidisciplinary teams of auditors, investigators, inspectors, analysts, and attorneys. I have worked with elected officials, law-enforcement partners, auditors, agency leaders, and the public to protect trust in government.

I believe Rhode Island's inaugural Inspector General must establish an organization, recruit and develop staff, promulgate fair and workable rules, create secure complaint and case-management processes, coordinate without duplicating the work of existing authorities, and earn credibility through independence, competence, and disciplined transparency. Those institution-building responsibilities closely match the work I have performed repeatedly.

At USCP, I inherited an Office of Inspector General of 12 employees and expanded it to 17 – a 42 percent increase -- while reshaping the organization to add dedicated leadership, legal counsel, administrative support, data science, information-technology audit, and inspections and evaluations capabilities. I modernized policies and workflows, advanced audit and investigative case-management systems, incorporated data-informed oversight, and completed the four-year FY2026–FY2029 strategic plan. The plan is designed to remain responsive to rapidly changing legislative-branch priorities and emerging threats, including risks associated with artificial intelligence. During my first nine months, I launched and led a performance audit of logistical operations that produced eight recommendations and later earned Council of Inspectors General on Integrity and Efficiency (CIGIE) recognition for the responsible auditor. I also established a recognition culture that contributed to CIGIE honors for a seven-member team associated with final closure of all 103 recommendations arising from the January 6, 2021, security reviews.

Independence must be both structural and practiced. I have submitted annual legislative priorities seeking stronger OIG law-enforcement authority, an independent budget, and independent legal counsel, drawing upon authorities granted to peer legislative-branch OIGs. While those proposals remain pending, I used existing authority to establish and fill a "Counsel to the Inspector General" position as a best practice. I keep congressional oversight committees informed monthly, brief the Capitol Police Board quarterly as required, and brief the Chief of Police monthly. This cadence promotes accountability without surrendering the OIG's responsibility to reach objective, evidence-based conclusions.

My earlier appointments offer direct preparation for Rhode Island. At Florida's DFS, I directly supervised professional auditors and investigators, while leading audits, inspections, and investigations across more than a dozen divisions. I directed enterprise risk assessments and work planning, strengthened contract

and grant oversight, and completed successful external peer reviews. In Albuquerque, I assumed leadership of an office without formal operating guidelines, established policies and procedures, advocated for appropriate resources and authority, expanded outreach, and built working relationships with the State Auditor, Attorney General, federal OIGs, law enforcement, elected leaders, and community organizations. At AFOSI, I established a centralized economic-crimes capability supporting more than 200 locations and hundreds of complex investigations worldwide.

My approach to this role would be independent, nonpartisan, evidence-driven, and procedurally fair. I would protect whistleblowers and confidential information; respect the existing jurisdiction of the Attorney General, Auditor General, Ethics Commission, and local and federal law enforcement. I will use memoranda and regular coordination to prevent duplication; apply recognized professional standards and peer review; and make public reporting timely, clear, and appropriately protective of confidential or pending matters. I view prevention and education as essential complements to investigation and enforcement.

I hold a Master of Public Administration and a bachelor's degree in criminal justice, as well as the Certified Inspector General, Certified Fraud Examiner, and Certified Financial Crime Investigator credentials. Within CIGIE, I currently serve as an Executive Council Member–At Large, Vice Chair of the Investigations Committee, and a member of the Legislative and Audit Committees. I previously served as a nationally elected member of the Association of Inspectors General Board, and served on the Professional Certification Board, wherein, I also managed the Certified Inspector General Investigator course.

Rhode Island has an uncommon opportunity to establish an oversight office whose credibility is designed into its structure, standards, relationships, and culture from the beginning. I would be honored to bring my experience across all three levels of government to that work and to help build an office worthy of the confidence and trust of Rhode Island's residents, public servants, and institutions.

My wife and I have longstanding ties to New England. We currently maintain our family home in New Hampshire, where my wife serves as the full-time caregiver for her mother. I previously served as Special Agent in Charge of AFOSI's New England Region based in Massachusetts and more recently worked for Hanscom Federal Credit Union in Massachusetts. Our connection to Rhode Island is especially meaningful; my wife and I were married at Point Judith Lighthouse in Narragansett in April 2008 and have maintained a strong affinity for Rhode Island and New England ever since. This opportunity would allow us to return permanently to the region where we expect to remain following my eventual retirement from public service.

Throughout my career, I have repeatedly been selected to establish, rebuild, expand, or modernize oversight organizations. I would welcome the opportunity to bring that institution-building experience to Rhode Island as it establishes its first Office of Inspector General.

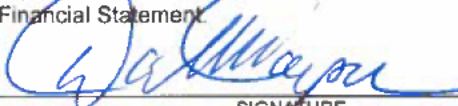
